

The public is invited to Tabla Rasa Gallery on Sunday, February 15, at 2:00 until 3:30 pm, for a PREVIEW of the reading by Willie Mae Brown, which will be presented at the Selma Public Library, in Selma Alabama as part of the tribute to the historical events which occurred there in 1965. **Tabla Rasa Gallery**, located at 224 **48th** Street, between 2nd and 3rd Avenues in Sunset Park, Brooklyn, is **free** and open to the public.

About this presentation:

Alabama was the stage for a number of the most significant events in civil rights history and home to many individuals who shaped the course of the Civil Rights Movement in America. March of 2015 is the 50th anniversary of the voting rights march from Selma to Montgomery Alabama and "Bloody Sunday."

According to Miss Brown, "We all know what happened in Selma, Lowndes County, Birmingham, and many places in the south, the deep south. We've heard of many killings. We've heard of the killings of Mrs.Viola Liuzzo, Emmett Till, and others. We've heard the speeches of Dr. Martin Luther King, "I have a dream"- being the most familiar, and we've heard of the long lines to register to vote.

"But there were other things going on in Selma at the time. There were whispers of homes suddenly catching afire, talks of beatings that were never recorded in the newspapers, disappearances of young black men, and guns being drawn on Negro men on Water Avenue. These were confrontations that the media did not record, and that investigators hid." And these are the stories that were told to or heard by Willie Mae Brown, and which she brings to the audience. They happened in the back woods of Alabama, were never spoken of in public, and have since died with the victims and their families. Miss Brown invites the public to take a glance into her personal history, as described in her forthcoming audio book, "My Selma," previewing at Tabla Rasa Gallery on February 15, 2015.
